Start a Community Foundation

Foundations change lives by giving to organizations and programs they support. Community foundations build their capacity to give through contributions from many donors within a specific geographic region. Local needs—needs of a particular town, county, or other specific geographic area—are met by local public charity.

Public charities like community foundations do not have the extra administrative and legal costs incurred by other types of foundations. The Internal Revenue Service designates community foundations as "public" since their resources usually come from many people each year.

There are about 500 community foundations across the United States. The Cleveland Foundation is the oldest. New York Community Trust is the largest community foundation. Eleven community foundations are established throughout Illinois. The cities of Aurora, Evanston, Highland Park, Oak Park, and Rockford have foundations. Champaign, DeKalb, and Dupage counties have foundations. Peoria and Quincy have "area" community foundations.

Starting a community foundation offers local donors financial advantages, tax savings, and recognition for supporting the quality of life in their communities. Individuals donate to a collective fund. The collective fund generates income to help a community respond to problems and opportunities.

To get started, a community needs to legally establish a fund complying with Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) standards. The Council on Foundations is the recognized source for helping community foundations comply with these standards. The Council also helps community foundations

with other topics: mission, governance, resource development, management, grantmaking and community leadership, communications and public relations, and inclusiveness.

The Council offers one-to-one assistance, an information clearinghouse, conferences, and publications for community foundations. For more information, contact:

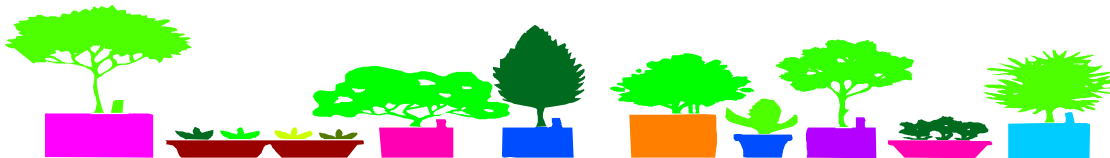

Children and Youth

For All Kids Foundation

Objective: Support at-risk and disadvantaged children by funding organizations that provide child care in underserved communities.

Eligibility: 501(c)(3) organizations.

Award: Funds for tuition scholarships and subsidies, facility improvement, and equipment upgrades; Grants are also made to help retain teachers and child care professionals who have demonstrated proficiency in their field. Grant disbursements are scheduled twice per year in February and September.

Deadlines: Letters of intent are due October 1 annually for funding in February; and June 1 for funding in September.

Application: Letters of intent of no more than 3 typewritten pages should describe the organization's history, mission, proposal, project goals, population served, and the amount of funds requested. The Foundation encourages organizations to focus on a specific program when requesting assistance. Organizations with clearly defined goals, cost control, and skilled management are sought. Additional review considerations include the percentage of revenues applied to direct program services; the socio-economic status of the population served; and the geographical location of the organization. Medical Library Assistance

National Institutes of Health, Department of Health and Human Services

Objective: To improve health information services by providing funds to train professional personnel; strengthen library and information services; facilitate access to and delivery of health science information; plan and develop advanced information networks; support certain kinds of biomedical publications; and conduct research in medical informatics and related sciences. Several programs are available within two broad categories of assistance to improve health information services: grants for institutions and grants for small businesses.

1) Grants for Institutions

1) Information Access Grants

Eligibility: Any public or private nonprofit institution which maintains or plans to establish library and information services to clientele in the health professions.
Award: 1 to 2 years of funding to initiate or to augment current technological usage including procedures or training components to instruct users.

2) Information Systems Grants

Eligibility: Any nonprofit institution or organization unit or consortium whose primary function is the acquisition, preservation, dissemination, and/or processing of information relating to the health sciences.
Award: 1 to 3 years of funding to utilize existing technologies or systems to improve the infrastructure of health information transfer or to initiate effective methods of exploiting the qualities of the infrastructure.

3) Internet Connections Grants

Eligibility: Any domestic, public or private, nonprofit institution engaged in health sciences administration, education, research, and/or clinical care.

Award: 1-year awards to provide health professionals access to remote databases, libraries, and other medical information resources and through the institutional Internet connectivity to promote rapid interchange of medical information nationally and throughout the world. Up to \$30,000 may be requested by a single institution; and up to \$50,000 may be requested for multi-institution networks.

4) Integrated Advanced Information Management Systems Grants

Eligibility: Any public or private nonprofit health sciences institution or organization.

Award: Limited to \$150,000 per year for 1 or 2 years.

Application: Federal application Form PHS-398 is used to submit Information Access and Systems Grants, Internet Connections Grants, and Integrated Advanced Information Management Systems Grants. 2) Grants for Businesses

1) Small Business Innovation Research Grants

Eligibility: Domestic small businesses—independently owned and operated for profit with no more than 500 employees—that are not dominant in the field in which research is proposed and that employ a principal investigator at least one-half time.

Award: Phase I grants for projects with 6-months duration to establish the technical merit and feasibility of a proposed effort that may lead to a commercial product or process funded under Phase II.

2) Small Business Technology Transfer Grants

Eligibility: Domestic small businesses—independently owned and operated for profit with no more than 500 employees—that are not dominant in the field in which research is proposed and that partner with a research institution in cooperative research and development.

Award: Phase I grants for projects with 1-year duration to determine the scientific, technical, and commercial merit and feasibility of a proposed effort that may lead to a commercial potential under Phase II application.

Community Mini-Grant Program

Rural Health Outreach Project: Health Resources and Service Administration

Objective: Improve the overall health of rural communities or of specific populations within rural communities in Illinois.

Eligibility: Community committees, groups or organizations with goals that directly impact the health and well-being of rural community members.

Award: Up to \$3,000 annually is available for projects. Grantees are expected to complete a brief project report within a year of project approval.

Deadline: April 30, 2000.

Application: Projects can extend or expand an existing rural health program or may propose a new program. Proposals are evaluated based on the following criteria: (1) Clarity—Proposals must clearly describe the project, the health problem to be addressed by the project, and the proposed program goals to address the health problem; (2) Community impact—Proposals must describe how the health problem addressed by the project was derived as a community health priority; the impact of the proposed project within the community or on a specific population; and the organizational qualifications of the proposed project administrators; (3) Link between objectives and outcomes—Proposals must describe specific expected outcomes and how outcomes will be measured; (4) Budget—Proposals must include a budget of how funds will be spent. Funds may be requested for items such as the purchase of materials and payment for services, but should limit payment for activities of existing staff to 50% of the total requested budget amount, e.g., \$1,500 for a funding request of \$3,000. Nursing Education Loan Repayment Program

Health Resource and Services Administration,
Department of Health and Human Services

Objective: To address the shortage of nurses at health facilities in certain areas of the U.S. by providing incentive for registered nurses to enter into full-time employment at health facilities in nurse shortage areas.

Award: Assistance in the repayment of nursing education loans for up to 85% of unpaid principal and interest. Applicants are notified in writing within 60 days after receipt of application.

Eligibility: Students who (1) will or have received a nursing diploma prior to October 1 of the current year; (2) plan to begin employment at least 2 years at an eligible health facility in the U.S.; and (3) have unpaid educational loans obtained for nursing education. Students must be licensed or eligible to be licensed and plan to take their board examinations.

Deadline: Postmarked by June 30, 2000.

Application: Applications may be obtained by writing to the address listed under "Information" below. Applicants are required to document the following: (1) financial need; (2) employment by an eligible health facility in an area designated as in "critical shortage of nurses" by the Bureau of Primary Health Care; (3) employment causes a net increase at the eligible health facility; and (4) ability to start work no later than September 30 of the current year. 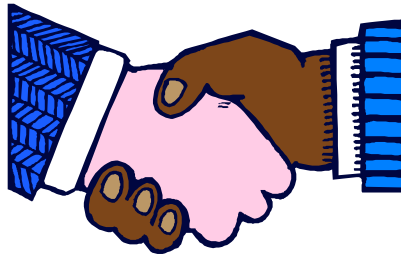
Labor Management Cooperation

Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service

Objective: To support the establishment or expansion of joint labor-management committees at the worksite, area, and industry-wide level in order to improve labor-management relations, economic development, and productivity.

Eligibility: Private, nonprofit labor-management committees; a labor organization, private company, or public agency applying jointly to create or expand a committee; private, nonprofit entities with labor relations experience on behalf of either of the two preceding example parties.

Award: Worksite awards range in amounts from \$10,000 to \$50,000; All other awards range in amounts from \$10,000 to \$100,000. No continuation grants are available.



Deadline: May 20, 2000.

Application: Applications are available, free-of-charge, upon request. Assistance with applications is provided informally. Applications are submitted directly to Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service headquarters.

Hesselbein Community Innovation Fellows Program

Objective: Support the professional development leaders working in the social sector.

Eligibility: Leaders with a demonstrated record of leadership and entrepreneurial performance who are engaged in innovative projects or programs. More specifically, candidates must be either a chief executive or senior staff member of a nonprofit organization, have a minimum of ten years work experience, and be available to attend 3, 10-day-long scheduled Fellows gatherings during the program year.

Award: Year-long fellowship that provides intellectual resources, opportunities, and guidance to encourage community innovation, leadership effectiveness, and pursuit of organizational performance. Travel and lodging costs are not covered under the award.

Deadline: Applications postmarked through May 5, 2000. Finalists will be contacted for interviews. Selected Fellows will be notified by July 17, 2000.

Application: Printed applications are not required. Submitted for application are materials to be considered by a selection committee. Materials include a one-page cover sheet, resume, and summary of relevant professional accomplishments; a description of the applicant's plan for innovation within her or his community or organization; a personal statement on leadership; three recommendation letters from references; staff organizational chart, list of board members, and proof of nonprofit status; and examples of materials that demonstrate the impact of the applicant's program or work. Allstate Safety Leadership Award

Objective: Recognize outstanding programs which promote public safety on local or regional level.

Eligibility: Businesses and organizations that conduct home, auto, or personal safety programs for the public.

Award: 17 Community Safety Program awards are rewarded. The award is a \$10,000 grant from The Allstate Foundation. Winners are also provided transportation and accommodations for one representative to attend the award luncheon in Washington, DC. If the winner is not a 501(c)(3) organization, the grant will be given to a qualifying safety organization of the winner's choice. Winners will be publicized.

The Arts

Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation

Objective: Support youth participation in music through repair and donation of musical instruments.

Eligibility: Individual students, schools, school districts, and community organizations. Three programs meet the needs of eligible applicants.

Programs:

1) Solo Program

Objective: Repair and donate instruments to outstanding student musicians who are financially limited and unable to obtain an appropriate instrument.

Eligibility: Students who attend private, public, or community schools. Eligible students must demonstrate competency and dedication to music by having three continuous years of instrument study and through performing with a musical group.

Deadlines: Annually, June 15 for August 1 awards; December 1 for February 15 awards.

Application: Applicants submit an application with supporting documents and audio cassette. Applications are available on-line or can be requested from the foundation. Supporting documents include a personal letter of background, interests, and goals; School Recommendation Form, and Letter of Financial Need completed by a parent or guardian. An audio tape demonstrating performance is required for application. News and other articles and stories are accepted in support of application.

2) Melody Program

Objective: Repair and donate instruments to schools whose music programs lack institutional financial support and whose students qualify for financial assistance.

Eligibility: Elementary, middle or junior high, and high schools that provide regular rehearsals or lessons.

Deadlines: Annually, June 30 for August 1 awards; December 1 for February 15 awards.

Application: Applicant schools submit a standard application with supporting documents that is available on-line. A letter of support from the affiliated parent association is required.

3) Special Projects Program

Eligibility: School districts, community schools of the arts, hospitals, nursing homes, and music therapy programs with ongoing instrumental music programs, fund-raising efforts, and compelling need.

Deadlines: Annually, June 30 for August 1 awards; December 1 for February 15 awards.

Award: \$500 to \$10,000 retail value for repair and purchase of musical instruments.

Application: Applicant institutions must demonstrate need, support and assurance of meeting eligible criteria through application and budget forms available on-line.
